Band specialises in jailhouse rock

IT WAS impossible to buy tickets for most of the Marsh Family's latest concert tour.

Three of the four shows took place behind prison walls.

The Marsh Family, a seven-piece family rock band with most of its members under 15, previewed songs from their new album to select audiences in Parramatta, Cessnock and Long Bay jails.

Just for a change of pace, they included a gig at the Easter Show, on the same day as silverchair. The band has made a reputation playing in jails,

having done gigs at correctional centres in every State except South Australia.

Warwick Marsh, the band's dad and guitar player, explained why they took the unusual step of a prison tour to promote their album, Straight From The Heart.

"We always get a warm reception. The guys love to

see the children, as that is one thing they miss most in prison.

"The inmates don't get a lot of music and this is our

way of giving something back."

Their latest album has been played on more than 50

radio stations and the video for the song Teach Your Children has aired on the ABC's Rage.
